Following a recent selection process three new Councillors join the Parish Council.

Phil Whitehouse (Stonnall & Little Aston Ward).

I have lived in Stonnall for almost 30 years and been actively involved in various community initiatives including being Chairman of Stonnall Campaign About Roads (SCAR) since 2005.



My career involved working in the Banking Industry for 25 years and latterly in the financial services industry as a Management Consultant.

As a new Parish Councillor, I hope to put this lengthy experience and knowledge to good use and contribute across all areas of the Parish Councils responsibilities.

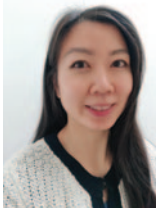

Rights of Way

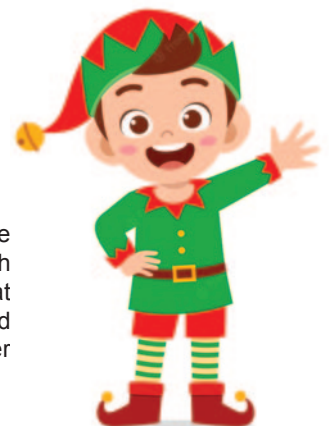

Stonnall is gradually returning to the lively, active village it was before the lockdowns, and, of course, gearing up for Christmas.

Before Christmas, however, there are still a few of the regular village events taking place in November. The Gardeners' Guild will meet on Wednesday 2nd in the Community Centre at 7.30 pm and Stonnall Stitchers will meet on Mondays 7th and 21st from 2.00 pm in the Village Hall. On Sunday 13th November there will be the Service of Remembrance in St Peter's Church when the trumpet will sound, courtesy of Peter Hunter.

The W.I. will meet at 1.30 pm in the Village Hall on Monday 14th and on Wednesday, 23rd, the Conservation Society will be enjoying a Social Evening, with "Cherrywood". Stonnall Coffee Club will continue each Wednesday morning from 10.00 until 12.00 noon, in the Community Centre until 7th December, when Christmas events take over.

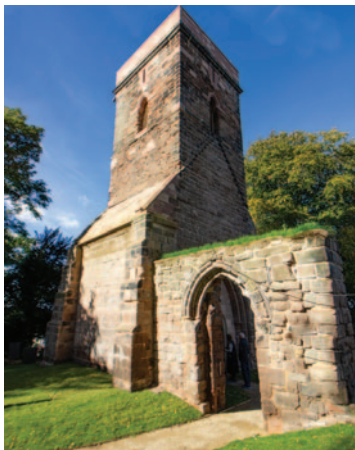
The Christmas events begin on Friday 9th December with the Stonnall Singers' Christmas Concert. The Singers will be joined by Walsall Harmonic Male Voice Choir in St Peter's Church: tickets cost £7.00 per person. Still in the church, on Sunday 11th, at 4.00 pm, the Christingle Service will be held. Everyone is welcome to attend.

What happens to the Coffee Club after December 7th? On the 14th around 52 regulars meet to go to the Beverley Hotel in Walsall for their Annual Christmas Lunch. This is a free event for the members, paid for by their weekly donations of £1.00 for tea, coffee, and cakes or biscuits, plus refills, and their £1.00 raffle, where all the prizes are donated. Coffee Club members also enjoy several free trips each year funded by their weekly donations.

Christmas events begin with the Dressing-up Nativity on Sunday 18th at 10.45 am and continue with the Service of Nine Lessons and Carols at 4.00 pm in the afternoon. On Monday 19th at 6.30 pm, it is the time for the Annual Village Nativity Pageant outside the Village Hall. Everyone is welcome to attend, dress up as Bethlehem townspeople, shepherds, sheep, or other characters in the Christmas story and sing carols to the accompaniment of members of Cadenza Brass, led by Peter Hunter. Warm drinks of mulled wine follow and there is a collection for St Giles Hospice and the Donkey Sanctuary, in gratitude for the donkey provided by Gorse Farm.

On Christmas Eve at 2.00 pm, there is, the Service of Hope and Remembrance and at 11.30 pm, Midnight Communion in St Peter's. The church service on Christmas Day is at St John the Baptist Church, Shenstone, at 10.00 am.

SHENSTONE MEDIEVAL CHURCH TOWER RE-OPENED



On Saturday 8th October, Bishop Michael opened our newly renovated medieval church tower. Guests included the Deputy Lord lieutenant, Lesley Knighton; the Chairman of Lichfield District Council, Colin Greatorex; Historic England Architect, John Tiernan; representatives of our grant



funders; workers from Midland Conservation Ltd; and many people from our local community. Many visitors went to the top of the tower to see the reconstruction



and stunning views, and then enjoyed tea and cake in the church hall. It was a wonderful day, the sun shone, and thank you to all our volunteers who made it such a special occasion.

A wooden Saxon church was built on the top of Shenstone's hill, around the same time as Lichfield Cathedral; and this church is mentioned in the Domesday book. In the 12th century, a stone church was built on the Saxon foundations. This church was used for 700 years, until the Victorians built the current parish church in 1860, leaving the old bell tower standing.

The Tower fell into disrepair, with holes in the roof and crumbling masonry. Historic England commissioned a survey to estimate of the repair cost, and in 2019 the Friends of Shenstone Tower was formed to raise funds and repair the Tower. We finished raising funds and started the repair a year ago completing it in August this year. The stone masons have replaced every crumbling stone with a new stone from a local quarry and repointed the whole building with traditional lime mortar. The carpenters have created a flight of stairs and landings that give us a display space inside the tower and easy access to the roof. It looks stunning and is well worth a visit, which are available by arrangement with the Friends of Shenstone Tower.

Unknown Visitors to Your Home

Sometimes, people turn up at your home unannounced, with the intention of tricking their way into it. They are known as 'cold callers', 'distraction burglars' or 'bogus callers', whose only aim could be to get into your home and distract you to steal your money or valuables.

***Always be aware when someone
you do not know calls at your door.***

Bogus callers may be smartly dressed and claim to be from the council, the police, health organisations or gas, water, or electricity supply companies. They can be convincing and persuasive. They may be men, women or even children. They may ask for a drink of water or coffee, to wash their hands, or use the toilet. Some may be looking for a person or a lost pet, or they may want to tell you about a charity for disadvantaged people, they often make up all sorts of stories that could catch you off your guard.

Some bogus callers target older and vulnerable people saying they need help urgently, they may ask the person to help them outside, which takes them away from the front door which is now open so that the accomplice can sneak in and steal money or small valuables items. They may ask to come in to make a phone call or have a glass of water.

Bogus callers often work in pairs or even teams. They are often well organised and extremely convincing. They know how to get under a person's radar. One will distract the person while the other searches the house for money or other valuables. Be on your guard with anyone who says they are in a hurry, do not let them pressure you or confuse you. They often use 'props' like an identity card or wear overalls with a company logo. They may carry a clip board with a logo on to legitimise their identity.

If in doubt, keep them out! Report them to Staffordshire Police

✓ **LOCK:** Keep your front and back doors locked, even when you are at home. Lock any side gates that give access to the rear of your property

✓ **STOP:** Before you answer, stop and think if you are expecting anyone. Check you have locked the back door and taken the key out. Look through a spy hole or window to see who it is.

✓ **CHAIN:** If you decide to open the door, put a door chain or door bar on first, and keep it on while you are talking to the person on the doorstep. (Normally when the door is shut and locked, leave the bar or chain off in case you need to get out in an emergency.)

✓ **CHECK:** Check the person's details before you let them into your house.

Some callers may offer to do repairs to your home and persuade you that something awful is going to happen if you do not act swiftly. They may want you to come outside so that they can show you a defect they have noticed that they can put right for a good

price. They often try to trick you into paying for unnecessary work.

✓ Do not agree to having any work done by someone who is just passing or claims they are doing similar work at someone's property 'just down the road'.

✓ Do not take their word that the work needs to be done at all. If you think the work needs to be done, get quotes from other companies – two or three should be enough – and you can ask a friend or relative for a recommendation.

✓ You can check whether the company is reputable through the local council's trading standards office.

✓ Do not be pressurised into paying them before they do any work.

✓ Do not accept any offer from them to drive you to your bank to withdraw the money.

✓ Do not keep large sums of money in your home.

✓ If someone claims to be in urgent need of help, only go to help them if you have someone else with you and never leave your house insecure. You can offer to phone the police or an ambulance for them instead.

Official looking callers at your door

Ask for and carefully check their identity card, even if it is a prearranged appointment. Check that they look like the person on the card, check that the name is the same on as the letter you have received. Close the door while you do this. Check the phone number on the card is the same as the company number you have. This will be on a recent bill/letter. Do not be tempted to just ring the number on the card as it may be a fake and you will be speaking to someone who is a part of the scam. If the caller came unannounced, ask them to call back later when someone can be with you. You can also tell them to contact you by letter to arrange a more convenient time. Genuine callers will always be happy to make an appointment to call and will carry an identity card with a photograph and they won't mind waiting if you want to phone and confirm their identity or want to rearrange an appointment.

Community Grants 2022/23

Do you represent a community group or organization? The 2022/23 Community Grant application process is now open and the Council welcomes requests from groups which help and involve local people. The Parish Council can only award grants using certain legal powers; specific powers allow the Council to provide funding for specific activities or projects which Members feel will be of benefit to residents of Shenstone, Stonnall or Little Aston.

Our grant awarding criteria has recently been updated as part of our internal audit. Key points are:

1. It is a condition of any grant application that the group or project must bring direct benefit to the residents of the Parish. All applications must clearly demonstrate how this will be achieved.
 2. Application forms must be submitted along with:
 - bank statement(s); both current and savings accounts
 - a constitution if not previously submitted or if it has been amended since it was submitted
 - the latest set of the group's accounts.
 - Newly constituted groups may be required to submit accounts later.
 3. Retrospective grant applications will only be considered under very special circumstances.
 4. The group should be a charity, voluntary or community organisation. Applications will not be considered from individuals, businesses, religious or political groups unless permitted by legislation.
 5. Any grant awarded must only be used for the purpose for which it is applied and must be spent within the year that it is awarded unless exceptional circumstances prevail. If the grant cannot be spent in the year it has been awarded the Parish Council should be contacted as soon as possible if it is likely that a request will be made to carry over any unspent balance, otherwise it should be returned to the Parish Council.
 6. Shenstone Parish Council reserves the right to request any further information that it deems necessary to assist the decision-making process.
 7. Ongoing commitments to award grants in future years cannot be made therefore a new application will be required each year.
 8. The size of any grant awarded is at the sole discretion of the Parish Council. Applicants should be aware that the Council will often prefer to pay a grant by directly purchasing the supplies or facilities referred to in the application rather than transferring monies to the applicants.
 9. Shenstone Parish Council reserves the right to refuse any grant application which is considered to be inappropriate or against the objectives of the Parish Council.
 10. All awards must be properly accounted for and evidence of expenditure should be supplied as requested. If the Parish Council is not satisfied with the arrangements, they reserve the right to request a refund of monies awarded.
 11. Under no circumstances will the Council provide a grant to pay for or subsidise any expenditure on alcoholic beverages or gaming.
 12. All applicants must submit proper auditable accounts to demonstrate how the grant awarded has been used.
 13. The decision of the Parish Council is final.
- Grant applications will be considered at the Finance, Legal Health & Safety Committee meeting in January with recommendations put before the next meeting of Full Council. Therefore applications and any supporting documentation should be received by January 3rd 2023 to allow the Clerk to check that the Council's grants criteria have been met.
