

POST OFFICE REOPENS IN SHENSTONE

After what feels like an eternity, villagers of Shenstone & the surrounding area can once again benefit from having a Post Office. Manny Singh & his father Narinder are delighted that from August 23rd they will be operating the post office from their village shop on Main Street. Also, on the 23rd the Singh Family will be donating £200 each to three village charities: Shenstone Cares, Friends of Greysbrooke School & St John the Baptist Church Hall.





As readers know, the Parish Council as the long leaseholder of the SYCC has been offered ownership of the SYCC by the County Council. Following careful consideration the Parish Council has concluded that it will not accept the offer but instead recommend to the County Council that the SYCC Management Committee become Trustees.

The Chair of the SYCC Management Committee who has joined the SYCC Working Group has been appraised of this Parish Council decision and the SYCC Management Committee have now indicated to the Parish Council that they wish to pursue the Trusteeship option. The Parish Council is very pleased that this preferred outcome will now be progressed as it is the primary way in which village halls in Shenstone Parish are successfully owned and managed including the Stonnall Village Hall. The Parish Council will ensure that during its remaining time as leaseholder it supports the Management Committee in delivering the repairs and improvements identified for early attention in the recent condition survey. Following a successful transfer of ownership from the County Council the Parish Council will continue to support the SYCC on a consistent basis to all other village halls and organisations within the wider Parish.

Lichfield District Council Local Plan 2040

The Local Plan is currently out for consultation and can be found on the Council's Planning website until the 30th August. Following all consultation representations made, Lichfield Council will submit the Local Plan 2014 to the Secretary of State for Housing, Communities and Local Government who appoint an independent Planning Inspector. The Inspector will report on the Local Plan during 2022 and if approved the Plan will be adopted in the autumn of 2022.

The final option chosen by Lichfield Council for the growth of Shenstone, Stonnall and Little Aston respects the Green Belt context in which all three communities are situated and the quality of each of the village environments and therefore no significant additional housing or economic growth is proposed beyond the existing, agreed proposal for 50 homes primarily located on land at Shenstone Business Park, Lynn Lane. The adoption of the Local Plan in the autumn of 2022 will then allow the Neighbourhood Plans for Shenstone, Stonnall and Little Aston to be refreshed as they are all over five years old. The Local Plan has several statements in respect of the three villages that will be further developed in each of the Neighbourhood Plan renewals. These statements identify that all new building to be of high quality design; the need for improved amenity provision; improved traffic management and some improved access to play provision.

The Parish Council will publish its own submission to Lichfield Council on the Parish Council



Shenstone's ever popular library and coffee shop has been open for both books and refreshments throughout the summer. It has been carefully managed to ensure that the safety of all volunteers and visitors meet the highest standard. Numbers are carefully monitored indoors and the large garden has been a comfortable space for both adults and children. The system has worked well and is being continued into the autumn. Meanwhile, the coffee shop will be serving indoors and out while the weather allows. Children's activities will continue. From September the Gallery in the coffee shop will be displaying original artwork once more. The programme changes monthly and covers a wide range of styles and much of it will be available for purchase.

The management team is grateful that longstanding volunteers have been joined by new volunteers to make all of this this possible. The skill and commitment from all those who lend their support to this venture is so much appreciated and we look forward to welcoming you soon to enjoy our delicious coffee and cakes, choose from a newly acquired library books, or join in with one of our clubs or activities.

Parish Council Grants

It will soon be time for the annual round of Parish Council Community Grants. Applications are welcome every Autumn from community groups or organisations across the Parish who need financial assistance for all sorts of projects or initiatives. In the last round of applications funding was granted to Little Aston Tennis Club for a new gate & fencing, Shenstone Community Library for installation of LED lighting, Footherley Hall for a virosafe disinfector to assist the fight against infection & a new battery-operated lawnmower for Stonnall Gardeners Guild, as well as many others.

Applications from October 18th are encouraged with forms available from the Parish Office.

The deadline is January 4th with funds released before the end of the financial year.

As well as community grants the Council also support larger one-off projects. Some of the recent projects include the new culvert in the brook on Stonnall Playing Fields & the re-surfacing of foot paths on the Lammas Land.

After a somewhat slow start, due to the pandemic, we finally got our Health and Safety Briefing in May and along with it the gorgeous HiViz jackets you can see us wearing! Since then we have begun to clear the bank above the carpark, it will be quite a long job! But we have received many offers of help from people in the village, and The Parish Council for which we are very grateful. Network Rail have sent a strimming team too. I am confident that we will have it cleared and planted with spring bulbs by the end of October. Inside the station ticket office we have been fortunate enough to have two very different exhibitions. The first was artwork created by Sutton Coldfield YMCA round the issues of mental health. The exhibition coincided with Mental Health Awareness week. The second exhibition was on behalf of Shenstone Tennis club and was to promote the club and Wimbledon



Fortnight. Hayley, our station officer, helped by producing word-searches and colouring competitions linked to tennis. Hayley really is an asset to our village community! We were very grateful to Karen Ashley for her help in displaying the wide range of tennis related artefacts that had been kindly provided by Shenstone Tennis Club Coach – Zoe Edwards. In September we are hoping to open a Sub-branch of Shenstone Library in the station ticket office. We are hoping that this Sub-branch will be particularly attractive to the young people and young adults that use the station to travel to their schools and colleges each morning as we try to ensure that books in the sub-branch are aimed at those age groups.

We have joined the Community Rail Network group, a national organisation promoting the adoption of stations and the involvement in them by their local communities. We have also joined the Lichfield Rail Users Group. We have been very well supported by Fay Easton Head of Stakeholder & Community for West Midlands Railway and Dave Harris line-manager, based at Sutton Coldfield. Our group has also formed links with the Friends of Wylde Green adoption group.

SAVE THE DATE – Saturday August 28th 2021

Friends of Shenstone Tower are holding a free 'dropin' for the whole community to celebrate the commencement of restoration of the old Tower.

During the event, which runs from 10am, there will be a traditional ceremony of cutting the first sod followed by an opportunity to see and hear all about the progress so far and the future plans for the ancient Tower. There will be a chance to chat with the committee, view displays and enjoy refreshments.

The Friends of Shenstone Tower (FoST) are now a registered charity, and the trustees have raised sufficient funds, obtained planning permissions

and been granted a lease in order to restore the old Norman Tower which has stood as a landmark for over eight hundred years.

The start date of 16th August for the renovation and preservation of the Tower has been long awaited. Of course, fund-raising will continue to loom large to provide for the future use and ongoing maintenance of the Tower.

The Tower is all that remains of Shenstone's Medieval Church which was built around 1200. It was constructed on the foundations of Shenstone's first church which dated back to Saxon times. The current church was built in the 19th century and the old church was knocked down apart from the old Tower; the outline of parts of the old church can still be seen in the churchyard.

Chairman of the FoST committee, Mr Jeremy Cotton said; "Funding support of the project has been eye-wateringly impressive.

The main funding has come from Historic England without whose support the project could not have got off the ground. Significant donations have also come from many members of our community. We have been supported by Lichfield District Council, Shenstone Parish Council, Shenstone Village Festival, Shenstone & Lichfield Artisans Golf Society and Friends of Greysbrooke School. Further support has come from charitable institutions large and small including HS2, the Garfield Weston Foundation, The Pilgrim Trust, The Leche Trust, and Bells Whisky".

He added; "We are all so grateful for this massive support from the whole community, for all donations large and small – they all played their part in helping to get our project under way".

Following removal of much of the ivy from the Tower the true state of the walls became evident and enabled the preparation of a meaningful, comprehensive design for their repair. The plans also included the design of internal floors and stairs which will enable safe access to the roof.

The old roof has rotted away and the restoration includes a replacement and the raising of the parapet by 1.1 metres to meet safety regulations. This increase ironically brings the Tower back to its original height as can be seen in old pictures of the Tower. It will allow safe public access to the roof which will be by arrangement only. When repair of the Tower is finished, arrangements will be made to open it to the public.

The services of specialist architects Anthony Short & Partners have been retained who has completed plans for the restoration of the Church Tower and now that the plans have been approved by Lichfield Diocese and Lichfield District Council the Friends of Shenstone Tower have leased the building from the church, this allows access to grants in order to complete the renovation. The lease will run for 23 years which allows the building to open for the enjoyment and education of the public. Part of the approval process was a bat survey that confirmed, although many are seen flying around at night, there are none in residence in the Tower. Approval has also been obtained to remove the self-set yew tree directly in front of the Tower which will be replaced by planting another yew tree elsewhere in the churchyard.







Arboretum



My first volunteering role was for exhibitions on Saturday afternoons where I would walk about the three exhibition areas speaking to the visitors. I would try hard to answer their questions and if not, always finding another volunteer with far more knowledge to help, learning too as I went along. Drinking a cuppa with another volunteer I met the Foodservices Manager and was soon "poached"! Not literally, but I moved to assist in that area. I started in March 2020 and managed one week before Lockdown struck. When I returned, last summer, I assisted with table clearing, preparing drinks, on the outdoor BBQ one day and was let loose with a till! All these jobs allow the Arboretum to provide a great service to visitors. Latterly, I have been helping the NHS Track and Trace QR for the Restaurant. For those that might know me, I love talking to people so it has been great. There are also many opportunities to help on special days and meet those very important and interesting servicemen and women.

What strikes me about the volunteers at the Arboretum is just how knowledgeable they are about the memorials and history. It makes me proud that there are so many of them who are such experts and visitors are always full of praise for the information they have received. Don't let than put you off though, we all have talents that will help the Arboretum. At first, I felt a bit lacking, but soon realised my assistance (no matter how small) adds enjoyment to someone's day out. There are good opportunities to learn yourself, as much or as little as you wish.

Covid-19 has had a very big impact on the Arboretum and the whole team has worked hard to keep the site open since June last year. One impact has been the loss of volunteers who felt they couldn't come back. Hopefully once our lives return to normal, life at the Arboretum will also return to normal too. The Arboretum is a beautiful, peaceful, and sometimes very moving place of which we should all be proud, so if you are looking for an opportunity to volunteer, please think about the Arboretum. The roles volunteers undertaken are varied, both indoors and out, can be front facing or in the back office and are performed by those both young and old.

If you check the website below you will find out not just the volunteering opportunities (under Support Us) but what is happening at the Arboretum. As well as the physical memorials you would expect, the Arboretum plays a big part in celebration and memorial days holding Armed Forces Day, VE Day, Armistice Day amongst many. You may have seen last year's VJ service with Prince Charles which was filmed at the Arboretum? What you might not have appreciated is that (Covid-19 allowing) they normally have quite a few other experiences throughout the year such as the Illuminated Arboretum in the winter, a Christmas Carol Service, Luna Cinema evenings, exhibitions and activities which both children and adults can enjoy as they go round the site. If nothing else, it is a wonderful place to walk, they even cater for dog owners, with a dedicated route.

Community Initiative to Commemorate Poppy Day 2021

I approached the parish council and they unanimously agreed to support this initiative by funding the cost of 100 poppies to be put up by the lengthsmen and displayed around the centre of each of the three parish villages.

Stonnall Coffee Club

Our Coffee Club is up and running again, to the delight of many residents, plus a few from further afield.

It was only completely shut for a short time, not the whole fifteen months during which the Hut was closed. This was because of the generous intervention of the Shenstone Library Cake makers, in particular Mary Jones. The Library Cafe had been given some funding from Persimmon Homes and another source, enabling them to provide cake to Shenstone residents, who would miss the cafe in Shenstone. This they kindly shared with Stonnall Coffee Club members so that volunteers from the Coffee Club were able to deliver cake on a weekly basis, to those members who wished to receive it, numbering about thirty.

Anyway, the frequently asked question in the village was, 'When will the Coffee Club be re-opening?' or, sometimes, 'Will the Coffee Club be re-opening?'. The answer was, 'Yes, on Wednesday 21st July', which it duly did, with chairs and tables spaced out, clearly labelled 'Entrance' and 'Exit', and some more delightful cakes, Churchill's favourite, available courtesy again of Mary. The usual team of three was behind the counter, with one or two more 'leaders' around to help, and twenty-nine people turned up the first week. In the second week numbers rose to thirty-three, including two from Edgbaston!

So now, barring any more restrictions caused by the pandemic, we hope we are here to stay, every Wednesday morning from 10.00 until 12 noon, with drinks and light refreshments and the usual raffle. We are hoping that we shall be able to celebrate at Christmas with our usual trip out to lunch. If you would like to join us but have never been before, just come along and you will be very welcome.

Stonnall Village Hall

Since March 2020, Stonnall Village Hall has been locked down, partially open and at last we are fully OPEN.

Support Staffordshire advised the village hall committee, through their ACRE guidelines that with effect from April 12th 2021, we could gradually open up the hall. Throughout the lockdown, the management committee had agreed to maintain regular cleaning of the hall and a deep clean weekly. Sanitisers and anti-bacterial sprays are placed in the foyer and the hall for all visitors to use and these are still available.

Towards the end of April, Stay N Play started, and in May the regular couples who practise their ballroom dancing returned. The size of the hall allowed larger groups who could socially distance such as Line Dancing and Tai Chi to also return. The Tai Chi group were so eager to return, they held sessions at the rear of the hall in the car park, before they were officially allowed inside.


In June, Yoga, the W.I. and Needlecraft came back, although The Stitchers apparently did more chatting than sewing at their first meeting!

An update from our Police Community Support Officer

The summer term saw the arrival of 6 parking buddies at Greysbrooke Primary School, St Peters' Academy and Little Aston Primary School. These were organised by PCSO Steve Smith who secured funding from the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner and a contribution from each of the schools and Shenstone Parish Council. Their purpose is to



make the area outside the primary schools, safer and clearer for all members of the public, especially the children. When asked for her opinion of their effectiveness at the end of the summer term, the Head Techer from Greysbrooke, Ellie Ballinger said, "The parking buddies are fabulous! They prevent congestion at the top of the road so when turning in/out of Barnes Road, it's much clearer and safer to see. Parents' feedback has been very positive. They loved them from day one and have said it's been much easier and safer to cross the road since they arrived.

Whilst on patrol, a number of people have expressed concern about contacting the Police on the 101 non – emergency number. An alternative way of registering a concern or reporting an incident is to use Facebook, Twitter or the Staffordshire Police web site. It is important that a police log is created when there is an incident that requires police attention; this is not done by emailing or sending a text to an individual officer. It also means that there can be a timely response to a concern, which will not happen if the PCSO is on rest days or annual leave.

Police clinics will begin again in September at a number of locations in the community where you can speak to a local officer, these will be advertised on the Parish council website.

If you are tempted to buy an electric scooter, STOP and THINK. Electric Scooters are classified as motor vehicles, because they are intended for use on the roads, therefore the rules of the public highway apply to them. The Government is currently running trials of electric Scooters (e-scooters); the trial areas in Staffordshire are Stafford and Newcastle-Under-Lyme. Outside of the trial areas, it is against the law to use a privately owned e-scooter on the public roads, cycle lanes or pavements. They can only be used on private land with the permission of the land owner. If a person uses an e-scooter illegally, they could face a fine of £300, get 6 penalty points on their licence and the e-scooter could be seized and it will not be returned and will be disposed of accordingly. To ride a trial scooter in Stafford, a person must be aged 18, have a provisional, full drivers or motorcycle licence UK licence (check the following online tool to see if you can drive on GB with a non-GB Licence (https://www.gov.uk/exchange-foreign-driving-licence)). E-scooters must have motor insurance, but this will be provided by the e-scooter rental operator. A trial e-scooter may be used on the road (except motorway) and in cycle lanes. They may not be used on the pavement. They should be only used within the local area hosting the trial. This means that buying an e-scooter to use in the villages, or anywhere in Lichfield that is not private land, is likely to cost a persons a great deal of expense and disappointment.

With the lifting of the Covid restrictions that have shaped our lives for the last 18 months, the volume of traffic and the speed of traffic on many of our roads has significantly increased. We would like to start the Community Speed Watch groups in both Shenstone and Stonnall in the very near future. The work they have done in the past in monitoring the speed of vehicles has been very important in helping to keep our communities safe.
