

Chairman's Report

Shenstone Parish Council were proud to support, and join in with, the Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations in various ways around all 3 Wards; from Thursday evening's lighting of the Jubilee Beacon on top of St. John's Church tower, to helping to fund the many street parties and events that were held over the 4-day period.

In my capacity as Chairman of the Parish Council I took time to visit as many as I could. By Sunday evening I had called in on no fewer than 17 different events...I have to say thank you for the warm welcomes, and all the cakes were delicious! A special mention to residents of Little Hay who not only had a wonderful party but also raised £1500 for Macmillan Cancer Research.

It was truly heart-warming to witness so many people, of all ages, enjoying real community spirit, whether it was just a dozen or so neighbours of a small cul-de-sac or the estimated 300 people who met on the Glebe on Thursday right up to what seemed like every resident of Stonnall on the Playing Field for the giant screening of the spectacular Saturday night Party at the Palace.

There are too many people to name individually for the tremendous amount of work they did in organising and running all of the events but on behalf of my fellow Councillors I extend massive thanks and congratulations to every single one of them, and also, thank you to all of the participants and attendees for ensuring that everything went smoothly and without incident. Heating Shenstone and Stonnall Feasibility Study

Funded by a government grant the Parish Council feasibility study of renewable heating solutions for Shenstone and Stonnall is steadily progressing.

Both villages held workshops in June where attendees were informed that their existing homes, because of their age, have well above the average heating cost demands. In addition over 95% of homes in the two villages use gas boilers for heating that release carbon dioxide, a greenhouse gas that drives climate change.

The Parish Council specialist consultant Bioregional informed the village workshops that there are two primary renewable heating options that they are to examine in detail.

The first is the introduction of air source heat pumps for all homes in Shenstone and Stonnall. These individual units move heat from the air outside your home and transfer it into useable heat inside

your home.

The second potential renewable heating option for Shenstone is a central energy centre extracting heat from ground source water via the existing Shenstone Pumping Station.

The hot water will then be networked around the village and into each home. The second potential renewable heating option for Stonnall is again a central energy centre extracting heat from an array of ground source water bore holes and the hot water will then be networked around the village and into each home.

The workshops gave broad support for these options to be further assessed by the consultants and for cost estimates to be completed by the end of July. The Parish Council and residents of both villages will then need to fully consider the final recommendations and then secure further central or local government financial support to turn the study into a viable, renewable heating proposal.

Application to build 59 homes at Shenstone Business Park, Lynn Lane

Application No: 19/00203/OUTM - Outline Application (Major)

This outline planning application was first submitted to Lichfield Council in 2019. As an outline application any detailed proposals related to the application can be reserved for later approval. With the exception of the access arrangements the applicant has reserved detailed proposals such as appearance, layout, landscaping and scale for submission at a later date.

The original outline application proposed the construction of 96 dwellings and up to 14,000 square feet of new office accommodation. The original application was accompanied by an illustrative layout showing the mix of house types, sizes and heights across the development as well as the location of office accommodation and landscaping treatments. The Parish Council and residents affected sent in detailed consultation responses at that time based on the original application content.

Sometime over the last three years the applicant has informed Lichfield Council that they are reducing the number of new homes to be built to 59. Recently with the final submission by the applicant on the only detailed element of the application, the access arrangements, the application has been sent out for further, final consultation in a letter dated 26th May 2022 which expired on the 17th June 2022.

Unfortunately the revised proposal for 59 new homes has no revised illustrative drawing or revised mix of house types, sizes and heights or revised location of office accommodation and landscaping treatments submitted. The change of numbers and change of illustrative information was not explained in the 26th May 2022 consultation letter and this has caused some confusion.

The Parish Council has written to the District Council to ask why they did not request a revised illustrative layout showing the mix of house types, sizes and heights across the development as well as the location of office accommodation and landscaping treatments at the point the change was made from 96 to 59 homes.

While a reduction in numbers on the site can be seen as a positive change we now wait for the reserved matters on several important details to be submitted and consulted on. Any applicant has up to three years following an outline approval to submit their reserved detailed proposals. Residents and the Parish Council will wait with continuing great interest until that further consultation commences.

Community Speed Watch Works

Community Speed Watch is an initiative whereby local residents can help make a difference in their community by helping to reduce the speed that motorists travel through their village or town. Once the recorded vehicle details have been validated by Staffordshire Police, a letter is sent to the Registered Keeper warning them about the use of excessive speed. If a vehicle is subsequently recorded speeding again in any Community Speed Watch scheme within the County of Staffordshire, a second, and more sternly worded warning letter is sent. On the third occasion, if the same vehicle is identified arrangements are made for a Police Officer to visit the Registered Keeper and issue a verbal warning.

Catalytic Converters

There has been an increase in the theft of catalytic converters across the county. The catalytic converter turns pollutants emitted from a vehicle's exhaust into less harmful gases. Most are located under the vehicle towards the exhaust which makes it easily accessible to thieves. Inside a catalytic converter there is a ceramic element coated in various precious metals like platinum, rhodium and palladium. This is what attracts thieves. In order to steal the parts, thieves need to slide under the vehicle and use a cutting tool to detach the box from the pipes around it. This means that how a vehicle is parked is important. Parking it close to fences or walls can help. Garages can be asked to weld the bolts shut. Devices can be purchased that lock around the convertor to make it difficult to remove. Staffordshire Police has a number of SmartCat forensic marking kits with stickers notifying that it has been forensically marked. A contractor has been recruited to restore the old path which leads from the new church, through the arch on the East side of the old tower and down towards Church Hill and, with Faculty permission achieved, we will be able to make safe the dangerous gravestones surrounding the

For the Shenstone Festival July 2nd and 3rd, 2.00pm till 4.00pm we will have a gazebo on site with an exhibition of photographs of the build to date as well as selling items of wood from the old bell tower (circa C16) and prints of an original oil painting by well-known local artist Dennis Harper. Trustees will be on hand to give out information fliers as well as answering questions about the build and the exciting plans we have for the tower's future use. For visitors, at least some of the scaffolding will be removed and this will afford exciting glimpses of the restored stonework.

The 200th Anniversary of St Peter's Church

The founding of Stonnall's Church of St Peter was begun in the year 1822, although it wasn't completed until 1823 and then, even later, in 1843, the Chancel, built of stone, was added. It had previously been a Chapel of Ease. However, taking 1822 as its founding year, it is now two hundred years old and will hopefully, continue to serve the



village of Stonnall until 2122 and onwards into the future.

To celebrate this 200th Anniversary, Stonnall had a special weekend at the Church, on Saturday and Sunday, 25th and 26th June.

The Church plays such an important role in the village, firstly for worship, but then also to celebrate births, marriages and deaths; to be a venue for those working in the churchyard and others to pause for refreshment; to host events such as Stonnall Singers' Concerts, Fundraisers, such as Music Days, and F.O.S.P functions and, through the Magazine, to circulate information to residents.

On Saturday 25th June, St Peter's was open from 10.00 until 4.00 pm and there were numerous activities, with displays from the Church, many village organisations and St Peter's School, as well as musical interludes of various kinds. There was also an opportunity to look at the history of the Church and personal memories, such as weddings. St Peter himself was specially remembered by the large fishing net full of colourful knitted fishes on display.

After the special service at 10.45 on Sunday 26th, there was a shared lunch.

Altogether, a joyous celebration and also a welcome fundraiser for the Church and other charities.

After over 40 years of serving the people of Stonnall and surrounding areas, Sandra Lawn from the Royal Oak, Main Street, Stonnall is moving to pastures new.

Sandra and her husband Dick moved from the Sir Robert Peel Pub in Bloxwich and bought the Royal Oak in 1981.

Following a refurbishment plan, they re-opened the pub in 1982 which was an instant hit with local people.

Over the years they have served a range of great quality beers, spirits and gourmet food evenings.

During their time at The Royal Oak, Sandra and Dick raised well over $\pounds 10,000$ for the Birmingham Children's Hospital which was a cause that became very dear to their hearts.

Following the sad passing away of Dick, Sandra ran the pub herself, always with her usual friendly outlook and smile, admirably steering the way through the impacts of Covid, keeping the pub open when possible.

Noticeable people using 'The Oak' during her time were many sports and TV celebrities including the likes of Steve Staunton from Aston Villa/Liverpool (and others) and Michael Elphick from the Boon TV series.

Going forward, Sandra plans to spend more time with her family, some of whom live close by and some as far afield as the USA.

On behalf of the people of Stonnall and surrounding areas, The Parish Council would like to express a much well deserved thank you to Sandra for her service to the community over the past 40 years and wish her all the very best of health and happiness going forward.

Lighting of the Jubilee Beacon Thurs 2nd June

The Platinum Jubilee Beacon was lit on top of St John's Church Tower at precisely 9:45 PM on Thursday 2nd June to coincide with the thousands of other beacons across the United Kingdom, the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, UK Overseas Territories, and in all the Capital Cities of the Commonwealth.

Shenstone's District Councillor and Chairman of the Parish Council, Cllr. David Salter donned his official Town Crier Regalia and read a specially written version of a Royal Proclamation to announce the lighting.

Approximately 300 residents assembled on the Glebe to witness the event and it was reported that the flame could be easily seen from Mere Green and Four Oaks. Those attending also enjoyed Mary Jones's specially baked individual Jubilee Beacon Tarts, made from ingredients from each of the four UK nations, Leeks from Wales, Potatoes from N Ireland, Salmon from Scotland and Cheddar Cheese from England, all washed down with a glass of Bucks-fizz or orange juice. Huge thanks to Ray Chamberlain, Gerry O'Mara & Cllr Neil Perry for their mammoth efforts in getting the gas bottles & beacon up to the roof.


The specially made commemorative beacon head is currently on display in Shenstone Library and will hopefully go on to form part of a permanent display within the renovated Norman Tower.

Lichfield District Council Community Governance Review

A community governance review (CGR) is a legal process that provides an opportunity for District Councils to review and make changes to community governance within their areas.

A community governance review can consider one or more of the following: • Creating, merging, altering or abolishing parishes • The naming of parishes and the style of new parishes • The electoral arrangements for parishes • Grouping parishes under a common parish council or de-grouping parishes.

Between 1 February and 25 April 2022 the Council invited Shenstone Parish Council residents and interested organisations to submit their views on existing arrangements and suggest proposals for change.

The Regulatory and Licensing Committee of Lichfield District Council (LDC) on Monday 20th June approved draft officer recommendation that Shenstone Parish Council should remain unchanged. That decision will now go to the full Council on the 12th July for consideration. The resulting recommendations with then be published for further consultation. The consultation period will run until the end of September 2022 with a view to submitting final recommendations to Council in October 2022.

The final recommendations would then be formally published by December 2022.

New Roundabout at Little Aston Recreation Ground

The Little Aston Recreation Ground Association management committee and all of the users of the site are hugely grateful to Shenstone Parish Council for the grant of £8,000 to pay for the purchase and installation of an All Inclusive Roundabout.
