Bumper Year for Community Grants

It is always nice to share some good news and providing financial support to our Community Groups and Organisations is a very important part of the Parish Council Year. So, we are delighted that following a record number of applications, Council is delighted to approve 26 grant applications with the overall spend of almost £47,000 more than doubling the amount spent last year. Of course, in these increasingly challenging times, the previous financial limits will return but with so many groups requiring assistance this year Council is pleased to assist.

Some of the successful applications include: Little Aston Village Hall who have been grant funded £5,000 towards its plans to convert its loft space into a Committee Room; £1304 to Stonnall Community Centre towards the installation of WiFi; £2178.95 to Shenstone Tennis Club for purchase of a Rebowall ; £1548.93 to Sporting Stonnall Juniors F.C to purchase new playing kits and £1668.00 to Footherley Hall care home for the purchase of two air mattresses to aid patients who are bed bound.

Other successful applicants include both Stonnall & Shenstone Playing Fields, Shenstone & Stonnall Village Halls, Friends of Shenstone Tower, Little Aston Tennis Club, Friday Friends, Brownies & Guides, Trinity Hall, St Johns Hall, Stonnall Table Tennis Group and Greysbrooke School. A wide range of groups young & old & covering health, leisure & learning.

Another successful applicant is the Committee of Stonnallbury 2023 who, after the success of their fun day in 2022, hope to bring the community together again for a repeat performance on 14th July 2023.

Hope the sun shines as it did last year.

Neighbourhood Plan Reviews for Little Aston, Stonnall and Shenstone

Later this year work will commence on separate reviews of the three existing village Neighbourhood Plans that are all now over six years old. Volunteers are needed to review the Neighbourhood Plans and identify any areas where the original 2016 priorities related to overall village planning, development and growth have now been met or where new priorities need to be identified. Over the spring and summer the Parish Council will tender for relevant planning consultants to engage separately with each village community review. Residents with interests in housing

development, recreation, transport, traffic management, open spaces, recreation, community facilities and commerce will all be invited to shape each review. The Parish Council is currently awaiting the approval of the Lichfield District Council Local Plan which sets the context for Neighbourhood Plans. That approval is due in the autumn when residents working groups will commence their work. Anyone who wishes to register their interest in shaping the future village plans please contact the Parish Council Clerk.

Renewable Heating Options for Shenstone and Stonnall

The government funded Shenstone and Stonnall feasibility study has now concluded and identified two renewable heating options. Given the recent and significant increase in the cost of heating a home the Feasibility Study has important findings for the residents of both communities. Both options identified require homes to be adequately insulated to increase the benefit of each renewable heating option.

The first option extracts heat from the aquifer below each village into an energy centre building in each village that will also extract heat from the air and use large electric boilers on the very coldest days. Homes will receive water at guaranteed 55 degrees centigrade into their home heating systems via insulated distribution pipes.

The second option is based on renewable heat generation in each home through individual air source heat pumps placed adjacent to each home. The air source pumps use electricity to provide room heating between 35 and 65 degrees centigrade and hot water up to 65 degrees centigrade.


The Parish Council working group will publish the full Feasibility Study and also a summary of the two options and hold two public meetings in March or April to further explain the options in more detail. The Parish Council working group will then ask all house owners if they would support a more detailed feasibility being undertaken. Any further study could only happen if government or other funding support is again available and that should be clearer in April.

Traffic Survey of Stonnall, Little Aston and Shenstone

The Parish Council identified 14 roads covering all three villages at the start of 2022 that have been subject to a detailed traffic survey by the Staffordshire County Council Highways Department. The survey is carried out every four years so that changes in traffic volumes and speeds can be monitored over time. The Parish Council has enhanced the current survey to cover more roads. We will be using the data from the current survey in 2023 as part of the three Neighbourhood Plan reviews details of which is covered elsewhere. Last year the Parish Council informed Staffordshire County council that it supports an approach of default 20 mph speed limits in existing 30 mph areas where people live, work, shop, play or learn, subject to appropriate exceptions and where this has community support.

Shire Oak Quarry Overview from the liaison group

Quite understandably, people from the Stonnall area may have been concerned a couple of years ago when JPE Holdings Ltd obtained planning permission to work the Shire Oak quarry area for extraction of aggregates and also for landfill.

As part of the planning permission regulations, a liaison group was set up to assist in the monitoring of the works at The Quarry, be the point of contact for any queries the public may have and try to help with better communication between all parties.

The liaison group is chaired by our local Staffordshire County Councillor, David Smith and is made up of a few local residents, representatives from Lichfield and Walsall Councils as well as Councillors who sit on The Parish Council.

The work of this group has been hampered during the Covid pandemic but is now back in full operation and plans to meet at least twice per year to follow a very detailed agenda. This includes ensuring all parties deliver on their objectives including to build on JPE's current progress to return the quarry area back to its natural state.

In fact, the Liaison group was recently showed an area as big as at least two football pitches that has already been reclaimed near the Lichfield Road (previous Quarry entrance) and is now meadowland with numerous trees also planted.

In future editions of this newsletter, there will be updates from the liaison group and also from the management team at JPE Shire Oak.

Below is a general summary from JPE about current production levels due to a downturn in activity affecting the construction industry.

Happy New Year to everyone from JPE Shire Oak Quarry.

Going forward JPE at Shire Oak would like to give updates to current site operations to everyone in the Stonnall area. This commitment was made in the last Liaison Meeting we had on site back in August 2022 that was attended by local representatives as well as some Parish and County Councillors.

We are very keen to encourage open and regular communication with everyone relating to The Quarry as we are aware of the potential impact a quarry might have on the local area and the Liaison Group is fundamental to this two way spread of information.

Due to the economic situation, it is clear the next twelve months are going to be very challenging in a number of ways for everyone.

We can all see the impact from cost of living increases, household bills rising and unemployment starting to increase across the country, along with the Construction sector in places slowing down with a reduction of house building and general development projects.

We have also felt the impact of this at JPE Shire Oak in the past four months, where we have seen a 70% drop on inert landfill coming to site. Also, sales of sands and gravel and other products has fallen by 50%.

The knock on from this is that some of the JPE staff unfortunately are on reduced hours and the business is now looking to reduce costs & overall spend across site and business to bridge the gaps.

We have also suffered an increase of trespassers/theft and vandalism on site throughout the past three months which has caused further potential issues and problems for the business.

Despite this, we are very optimistic that JPE will be able to meet its overall objectives within reasonable timescales whilst doing our best to mitigate any impact from the quarry on the local area.

Christmas Fayres


Shenstone Christmas Market

LOCAL ELECTIONS THURSDAY MAY 4th



Local Elections are taking place across England on 4th May 2023. At these elections you will need to bring a photo ID to be able to vote.

You can use any of the following- if the document is out of date, you may still use it if the photo still looks like you.

- PASSPORT
- DRIVING LICENCE
- BLUE BADGE

You can also apply for a free voter I.D document, known as a Voter Authority Certificate.

To do this, you need to provide Name, Address, Date of Birth & National Insurance Number & a photograph with the same guidelines as a passport picture. Once your I.D is issued to you, it simply needs to be shown at the polling station.



Shenstone Community Library Environment Group

The latest group at Shenstone Library is the Environment Group. Along with other libraries, we are planning activities that will take place throughout the year to highlight how our community can take action to celebrate and safeguard the natural world.

Although we are all urged to reduce and reuse first, recycling is clearly very important too, and the library now developing opportunities for you to bring along 'hard to recycle' items, and at the same time, support various charities.

Recycling at Shenstone Library:

Against Breast Cancer

Recycled bras help to support (after they have supported you!) small businesses in developing countries. Expensive to produce locally, they have a new lease of life in countries such as Tonga, Ghana and Kenya, providing income for people in developing countries. They don't go to landfill but instead have a new lease of life. £700 is donated to



research for a cure for breast cancer, for every tonne of bras collected. Shenstone Library is now on the ABC map so people who don't use the library know where to make donations.

Lions Spectacle Recycling

Lions have been recycling since 1967. Glasses collected go initially to Medico France, and then are sent on to eye clinics in Papua New Guinea, Sri Lanka, Ghana, Nigeria and Nepal. Unite for Sight

Volunteers take spectacles with them on missions to countries around the world. The National Police Aid Charity sends glasses to eye camps in Gambia, to the Army in Mali, and to independent charities in Chad, Nigeria, Tanzania and Bangladesh.

Safety Handrail Installed

The tender specification was updated & thoroughly reviewed by both the Neighbourhood Planning & Property Committee & Full council.

THANK YOU CREATIVE PLANTS

Shenstone Parish Council would like to thank Creative Plants for their generous donation of a large quantity of plants for use around the area. Several are being used to enhance and help relieve the outlines of the new safety fence behind the Norman Tower, many will be used to brighten the Library garden and help encourage butterflies, bees and other insects. The rest will be used to enrich our recreation areas and in some of the planters around the villages.

Shenstone Medieval Church Tower Now Open

The repair of our medieval church tower was completed and it was reopened in October last year by the Bishop. At that event, many local people went inside the Tower and up to the roof to see the repair and stunning views. Since then, we have opened the Tower on the first Saturday of the month from 10 to 12, and many more people have visited the Tower. We also decorated the Tower with lights for Christmas, as shown in this picture. We will continue to open the Tower on the first Saturday of the month. The keys are also available from the library to see the inside of the Tower, but visitors cannot go onto the roof unescorted.



The next phase of our renovation is to fit out the inside of the Tower with visitor attractions and historical information; this is underway and we hope to complete this during 2023. We welcome visits from any group or organisation within the village or from further afield – please just get in touch with us, either direct, or through the library or parish office. Parking around Shenstone Station

In 2021 residents of roads local to the station began to experience the effect of the railway company implementation of car parking charges. Following a great deal of research and a public consultation, a Traffic Management Order (TMO) was put in place around the station area of Shenstone. The Parish Council and local Councillors continue to monitor the level of success in reducing obstructive parking by rail users. Generally, it appears to have been a success with those rail users who continue to park on the highway generally adhering to the regulation.

The Parish Council's main concern was the potential impact of parking moving to other roads which are not covered by the TMO. However, mainly due to many people working from home, the station usage has not returned to pre-pandemic levels, some vehicles appear to be using the car park again and the amount of parking areas covered by the TMO appears to be more than sufficient at the moment for those regular commuters. Obviously, the Council are aware that there will always be a certain amount of "poor" parking not just in the area covered by the TMO and following a review with Staffordshire engineers in 2022, residents concerns are still being reported. Of course, any concerns within the TMO area will also be passed on accordingly.

Stonnall Hut

Following community consultation by the Parish Council in 2020/21 the Council recommended to Staffordshire County Council in 2021 that the existing Management Committee was best placed to take over the ownership of the Stonnall Youth and Community Centre. The Management Committee of the newly named Stonnall Community Centre have recently signed the transfer documents

and the photographs above shows long standing members Doug Morrison & Val Neale signing and witnessing the legal transfer agreement.

Target Hardening - Responding to vehicle crime

Theft of vehicles in increasingly commonplace across the UK with offenders either utilising keyless technology such as fobs and relay devices or they are gaining entry into a property to steal car keys. The following model and make of cars are often targeted:

- Ford Fiesta, Focus, Transit and Rangers
- Audi A4, RS4, TT, A3, Q3, Q7
- BMW M40, 330 and X5
- Mercedes C220 and Sprinters

Most of the cars stolen annually in the UK come under the category of 'Keyless car theft'. This is where criminals use hacking devices that can remotely exploit the weakness of modern vehicles. Many vehicles have "keyless entry and ignition systems" and offenders use devices to trick the car into thinking that it is the rightful owner trying to use it. Some offences are opportunist signal blocking attacks where the thief jams the signal from the key fob telling the car to lock, thus keeping it open when the person thinks they have locked it, allowing the contents of the vehicle to be plundered or the vehicle to be stolen.

Some criminals use sophisticated specialist tools to create a spoof fob. Others use a car relay attack which is where offenders work in pairs, one will wander on to a driveway of a targeted vehicle, often at night. They will get as close to the house as possible and hold a box with an aerial against the property. The device can pick up the faint, distant signal emitted by the vehicle key from wherever it is in the house. This includes the spare key which is often thrown in a drawer out of sight. It amplifies and repeats the signal to the second offender who will be holding a related device next to the vehicle. This makes the vehicle believe it is simply being unlocked and within minutes, the vehicle has been accessed and is driven away. Organised crime gangs are quickly selling stolen vehicles on, stripping them down for parts as there is a worldwide shortage of car components or shipping them to another country in containers. Sometimes, offenders leave a vehicle for a while before moving it to its destination to ensure that it is not being tracked. Neighbourhood networking apps are very useful to report the theft of a vehicle and to get all the local residents looking out for it or any other vehicle that seems abandoned or parked suspiciously and reporting it to the Police.

Target hardening is acting to make it very difficult for your vehicle to be stolen. Consider the following preventative measures:

- Don't leave valuables on show.
- Make sure your car is secure, check it manually and ensure all windows are closed. Even if you move away from your car for a short while, lock it.
- Do not leave the vehicle running whilst unattended, even for a matter of seconds. Opportunist thieves cruise around the streets looking for such vehicles and they will steal the car within seconds.
- Consider using physical security such as a steering wheel lock, wheel clamp or a bollard or post on your drive to prevent the removal of the car. These items acta s deterrents as many modern thieves prefer not to attack these types of physical security devices as they want to get away quickly without getting caught.
- CCTV cameras and good lighting can act as deterrents.
- Place key fobs in a Faraday pouch this is the first line of defence against relay attacks as it blocks the signal given off by a key. Any mental container, including a filing cabinet, will do the same thing.
- Fit an alarm, if your car is not fitted with a manufacturer's fitted alarm and/or immobiliser, consider installing an approved system
- Disable keyless entry on your key fob check with the manufacturer.
- Install a tracker system, this can increase the chance of recovery of your car if stolen. Many systems activate when the car is stolen and track the car via GPS and other systems.
- Secure your number plates by using one-way clutch head screws to secure number plates.
 - Park the vehicle in the garage.
- Burglar proof the doors to your property so that thieves cannot get in to take your car keys, 9/10 of forced locks are snapped, ensure you have anti-snap locks fitted to front, rear and patio doors.
